Fall Dates and locations will be:


September 17 - Beaver Lake 9:00-12:00 (large appliances included)

October 8- Louisville (1st & Cherry Street) from 9:00 - noon (large appliances included) Anything with a battery or cord will be accepted.

Limit of 2 large appliances per household at the Louisville event. Fees apply to alkaline batteries, all styles of televisions (including flat screens) and CRT (Cathode Ray Tube) items.

Come to the Cass County Fair: August 10- 13

KCCB will have a booth in the Expo building and we'll be recycling plastic bottles, aluminum cans and cardboard on the fairgrounds again. Bring any old cell phones and rechargeable batteries to our booth for recycling and get a free giveaway. Kids can stop by for a litter scavenger hunt and check out our composting worms. Slattery Vintage Estates

Nestled in the heart of rural Cass County, Slattery Vintage Estates offers a unique getaway, night out or even a special place to say "I do." Being a frequent visitor of SVE, I had noticed on my previous visits that Slattery is in many ways committed to sustainability. Interested in hearing more about their story, I

took a trip out to Slattery Vintage Estates to learn more about SVE and their origins from owner/manager, Barb Slattery.

Purchasing the land in the 90's and planting a vineyard in 2001, Barb had the vision of eventually opening a Bed and Breakfast. The house was finally built in 2006, but it was decided due to complications, to set the Bed and breakfast idea aside and instead open a tasting room for Nebraska wines. "We slowly started hosting weddings and opened our Glamping in 2010, we were the first place in Nebraska to start Glamping" Barb states proudly. Since it's inception, Slattery Estates has

welcomed over 100,000 people from all over the world to their unique space to relax in nature and share their love of Agritourism.

When It comes to sustainability, SVE is committed. Barb had just taken a large load of recyclables to the recycle center the day before I arrived. She noted that it's a lot of work and a bit of a drive but feels it's the right thing to do. Nearly all food scraps are fed to their chickens and additionally, the chickens keep the bugs at bay. Barb also commented that even our most affordable wedding



package includes real dinnerware for the meal so we aren't creating disposable waste. Walking around the grounds, Barb pointed out all the native plants they have for pollinators and stated that they only use insecticides when absolutely necessary (to protect the grapes). We are adding new recycle bins for our customers this year so they can take more ownership in helping us recycle instead of staff sorting and doing it all Barb not-

ed. In addition, Barb shared that she hopes that taking a trip out to visit us, people that they can not only relax but are newly inspired to care for our resources and have a greater appreciation for Agriculture in Nebraska.

A few special events are booked for the summer such Cajun Fest July 23 and live music every Friday and Saturday evening! For more information about SVE, visit svevineyards.com We are so

Recycling at the Cattlemen's Ball



KCCB undertook a large role at the Cattlemen's ball this year held at the Cass County Fairgrounds.
